

Camp of Mengoub - G.T.E. 3, foreign workers' camp, 1,010 meters altitude, under supervision of Department of Industrial Production, Rabat, visited by Dr. Wyss-Dunant, August 1, 1942.

Four months ago the camp was full; since then the group has been removed to Menabba, so that only one detachment is left.

Personnel - 38 men, all Spanish. (7 detached to the station, and 3 to the soup kitchen.

Capacity of camp, 190 men.

Camp - It is situated on the railroad line. The barracks are of a permanent character, with an attic, a fireplace for heating in winter, and small rooms for two or three men. The beds are wooden frames with wire springs. They are equipped with a mattress, one blanket with comforter and a sleeping bag.

Food - See report on the Camp at Menabba.

Clothing - See report on the Camp at Menabba.

Hygiene - Abundant supply of water; all the showers and laundry one wants.

Infirmary - Sick persons are taken to Bou-Arfa. The company doctor comes once a week. One refugee doctor and a male nurse give their services. At this moment, there are no sick persons. Medicines are furnished by the company.

Salaries - Masons receive at least 12 francs. Workers, 7.25 francs. For extra work, 3 or 4 francs extra. Working hours: from 6 o'clock in the morning to 12 noon, and from four in the afternoon to seven o'clock at night.

Sports - Foot-ball. Sundays five persons permitted to go to Bou-Arfa or Colomb-Bechar.

Books - Internees have several Spanish books and receive newspapers.

Mail - Every two days.

Discipline - Nothing special to mention.

Interviews with men (without witnesses) - Morale excellent. No complaints.
